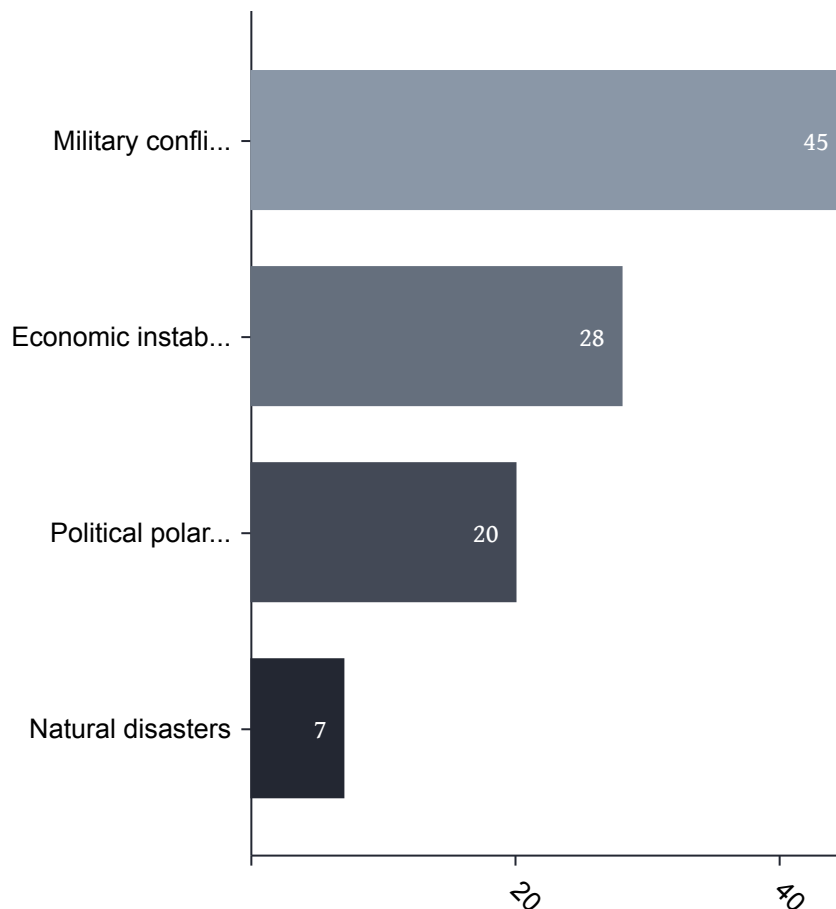

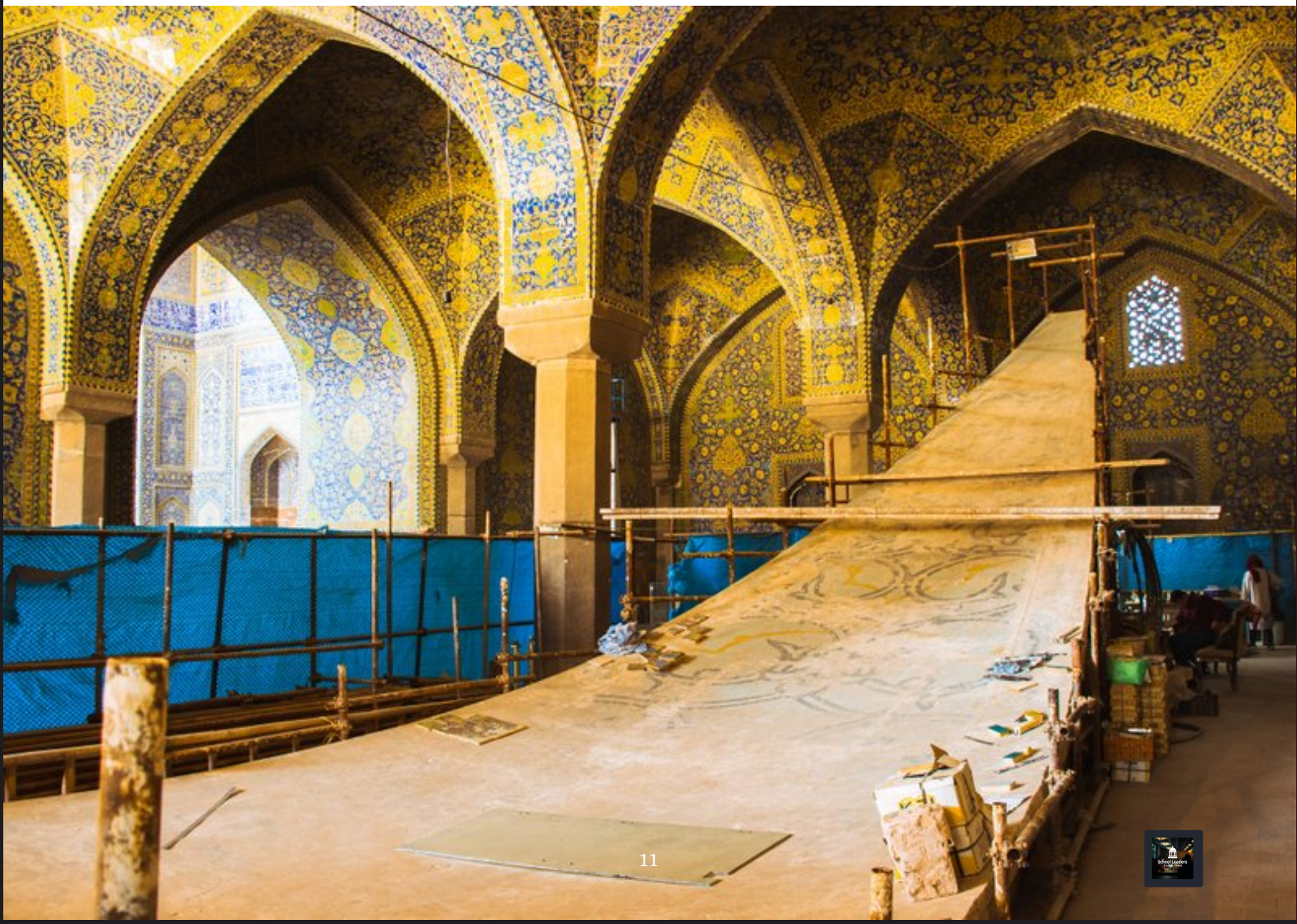
- Ancient trade routes made this region a cradle of civilization.

Prophetic Words for Troubled Times

He spoke of a future filled with conflict—"wars and rumors of wars"—and made it clear that the presence of unrest was not a reason to lose heart. Instead, He said, "See that ye be not troubled." This shift in perspective turns instability into an occasion for faith, for watchfulness, and for deeper trust in God's control and promises.

The Language of Birth Pains: What Instability Means for Believers

Iran and Israel in Biblical Prophecy: Ezekiel 38 and Beyond

Ezekiel 38 is a pivotal chapter for those seeking to understand modern Iran (ancient Persia) in the prophetic landscape. In vision, Ezekiel saw Persia as part of a future coalition positioned against Israel. While it would be premature and reckless to claim our present crisis is definitively this moment, it is biblically sound to note that Iran's alignment against Israel places it within the sphere of prophecy. The accuracy of these ancient words draws our attention to God's sovereignty—He has seen these days in advance. We watch world events not to speculate but to affirm the Bible's reliability and to pray with renewed diligence.



Modern Iran and Biblical Fulfillment: Clarity and Caution

While many are eager to match each headline with a specific prophecy, wisdom requires caution. Ezekiel's vision speaks of alliances, motives, and ultimate outcomes only God can fully see. When Iran forms military coalitions or antagonism toward Israel, it should certainly get our biblical attention, but humility reminds us not to force exact matches where timing and intent may differ. We are called to be watchful, not speculative or sensationalistic.

- Acknowledge the prominence of Persia (Iran) in prophetic Scriptures.
- Pray for both insight and restraint when interpreting modern news.
- Trust in God's unfolding purpose, even when every detail is not yet clear.



Current Events Through a Scriptural Lens

How should believers process today's events in light of prophecy? First, by remembering that God was, is, and always will be in control. The movement of armies, the signing of treaties, and the escalation of words all fall under His sovereign hand. Our call is to see beyond headlines, ask wise questions, and stay rooted in Scripture. When Iran and Israel dominate the news cycle, let it drive us deeper into prayer and the Word—not into panic or divisive arguments.

- Faith over fear, always.

- Scripture before speculation, always.



Jerusalem: The World's Burdensome Stone

Zechariah prophesied that Jerusalem would become a “burdensome stone” for the nations—a city so significant that the world’s powers would continually be drawn in, even entangled, with its future. The Church's Call: How Christians Respond

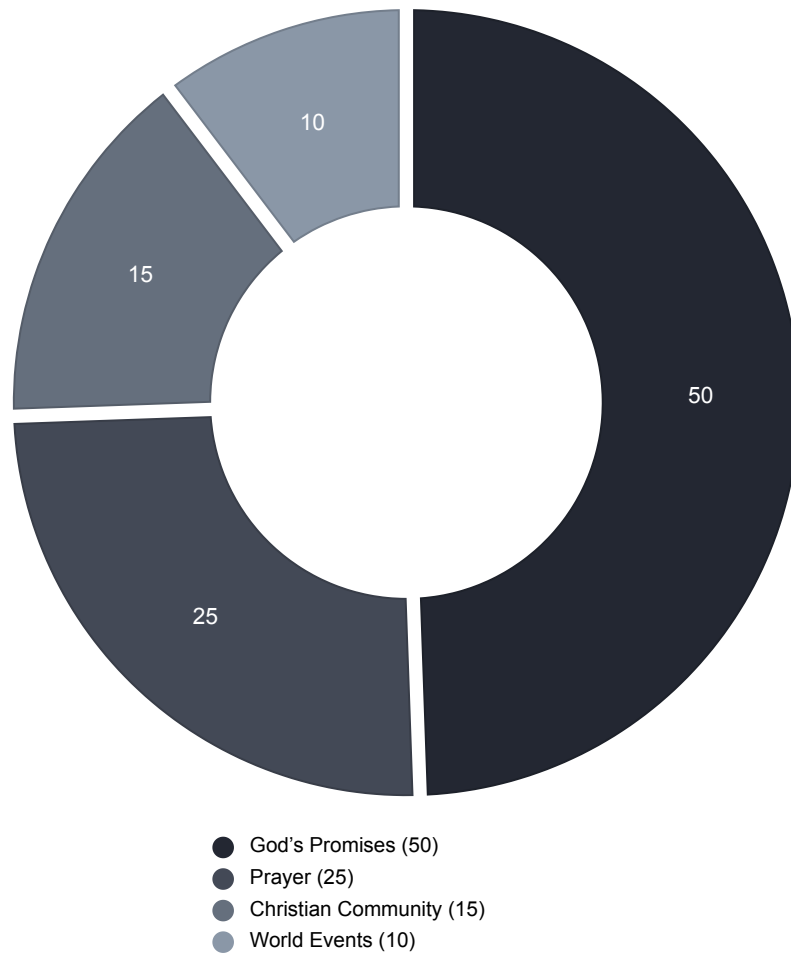
Praying for Peace Amid Chaos
